A BILL
TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

To make appropriations for the support, maintenance and development of public education in Alabama, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2027.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2027, for debt service, and for capital outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act and the amounts specified in subsections (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act. For the purpose specified in subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by programmatic area and the total for all programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties.

Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in this



28 act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the
29 credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers'
30 Standards and Training Fund, Alabama Head and Spinal Cord
31 Injury Trust Fund, Driver Education and Training Fund, Special
32 Education Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other
33 listed funds and are hereby made for the support of public
34 education in Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30,
35 2027, and the appropriations herein made shall be subject to
36 the provisions, terms, conditions and limitations of the
37 Budget and Financial Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975,
38 Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), the provisions of the Budget
39 Management Act of 1976 (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1
40 et seq.), and shall be in the amounts hereinafter specified.

41 (b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Other Funds"
42 and "Total" are as set forth for the purpose of establishing
43 amounts estimated to be available by programmatic area from
44 sources other than those listed in subsection (a) of this
45 Section 2, in order, upon consideration of such other funds so
46 estimated to be available, to promote the accountability for
47 an efficient use of funds available, and the same are hereby
48 appropriated by the Legislature. Provided, however, that
49 regardless of the ending date of any pay period which has been
50 or may be established by the Legislature for the payment of
51 salaries of state employees, the entire payment due shall be
52 made from the fiscal year's appropriation in which the pay
53 date falls.

54 (c) All appropriations made in Section 3 shall be at



55 the program level. Any directed expenditure of funds below a
56 program shall be from funds appropriated for the program.

<p>169 The funds appropriated for Workforce Development are to be expended for those costs 170 incurred by the State in honoring commitments to pay workforce development costs, 171 including services and other assistance and expenses of recruitment and training of 172 a company's workforce, that are undertaken to induce companies to locate and expand 173 their operations in Alabama (described hereinafter as a "Project") and to develop 174 and implement training, placement and recruitment programs that will improve 175 development and expand the State's workforce. Such costs include, but are not 176 limited to: (i) AIDT operating costs directly related to a Project; (ii) wages and 177 benefits for trainers engaged by AIDT for the purpose of a Project; (iii) costs 178 which the State has agreed to pay under the terms of a Project Agreement with a 179 company that are necessary and reasonable charges incurred by the company or its 180 affiliates for personnel providing training to the company's employees, whether 181 those trainers are employees of the company or its vendors or suppliers, including 182 wages, benefits and travel (domestic and, when necessary, international); (iv) any 183 necessary materials, equipment, manuals, or other relevant training materials; (v) 184 the costs incurred for purchasing or repairing or replacing training tools and 185 equipment; (vi) costs incurred for the purchase or construction and maintenance of 186 training facilities; (vii) travel expenses for prospective and current employees and 187 trainees, including travel, food, lodging, relocation, and other costs necessary and 188 reasonable to enable the company to secure a qualified workforce; and (viii) outside 189 training fees. The above funds appropriated for Workforce Development shall be 190 expended primarily for the training of Alabama residents. It is further the intent 191 that contracts with vendors to provide workforce training shall be inclusive and 192 reflect the racial and gender diversity of the State. The Secretary of the 193 Department of Commerce shall report semi-annually to the Chairs of the Senate 194 Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, the House Ways and Means-Education 195 Committee, the Finance Director, and the Legislative Fiscal Officer any funds 196 allocated for workforce training. Such report shall include a summary of the persons 197 trained and the vendors providing the training. The report shall contain information 198 including the residence, race and gender of the persons trained and of the principal 199 or majority owner of the firm or business contracted with to provide the training 200 services.</p>

The State Superintendent may also request additional funds so that additional cohorts can be expanded as Cohort 1 schools leave the program over the next few years. Any expansion of new Cohorts should be modest with respect to the purpose of this program which is expected to offer extraordinary supports to a relatively limited number of schools at a time. 2855 Section 4. It is the intent of the Legislature that
2856 any institution accepting funds appropriated in this bill do
2857 so contingent upon their compliance with the provisions of
2858 Article 6, Chapter 1, of Title 41, Code of Alabama 1975.

2859 Section 5. In addition to the appropriations herein
2860 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or
2861 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act,
2862 including grants by the Congress of the United States,
2863 municipalities or counties, to any department, division,
2864 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or
2865 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and,
2866 in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to
2867 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency,
2868 institution, office, or officer to be used only for the
2869 purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or
2870 shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal, and
2871 educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as
2872 deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and
2873 the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public
2874 Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing services

2880 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education shall

2920 Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of
2921 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has
2922 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or

2943 Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the

2946 Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$1,175 per
2947 month for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending
2948 September 30, 2027. The State Employees' Insurance Board will
2949 adjust the insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain
2950 the aforementioned fixed rate.

2951 Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of
2952 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for
2953 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026 to the various state
2954 agencies and institutions in this act, including
2955 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are
2956 unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2026 are hereby
2957 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices, and
2958 institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2026.



2959 Section 15. The At-Risk and High Hopes appropriations
2960 made to the State Department of Education shall be expended at
2961 the discretion of the State Superintendent of Education, with
2962 input from other Alabama State Department of Education
2963 advisory personnel, for activities or programs designed to
2964 enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. In an effort to provide
2965 the best and most efficient implementation, administration of
2966 the funds shall be assigned to and allocated by the Alabama
2967 State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and
2968 Financial Support.

2969 Section 16. (a) All nongovernmental entities,
2970 identified by the Legislative Services Agency, which are
2971 allocated funds in Section 3 of this act shall file a report
2972 with the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education
2973 Committee, the Senate Committee on Finance and
2974 Taxation-Education, Finance Director, and the Legislative
2975 Fiscal Officer prior to the start of the 2027 Regular Session,
2976 regarding the proposed expenditures and usage of the funds
2977 appropriated in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2027. The
2978 Legislative Services Agency shall provide notice to the
2979 identified nongovernmental entities within 60 days following
2980 enactment of this act regarding the reporting requirements and
2981 the methodology to submit reports and format to be used, which
2982 may include an online platform.

2983 (b) In the event an entity was appropriated funds from
2984 the Education Trust Fund in the fiscal year ending September
2985 30, 2026, the entity shall also include in its report a



2986 detailed breakdown of the expenditure and use of those funds,
2987 including an inventory of the services delivered and number of
2988 clients served, pursuant to guidelines established by the
2989 Legislative Services Agency.

2990 Section 17. The State Superintendent of Education
2991 shall notify each local superintendent and finance officer of
2992 each local education agency by email regarding the
2993 availability and application process, including any required
2994 forms, for any available grant opportunities during FY 2027.
2995 The State Superintendent shall notify all members of the local
2996 legislative delegation five days prior to the announcement of
2997 any grant made to any entity located in the legislative
2998 jurisdiction. The five days prior notice requirement shall be
2999 waived in the event of a declared emergency. The Governor
3000 shall encourage the Department to disburse the funds provided
3001 herein on a nondiscriminatory basis.

3002 Section 18. Except as may be herein otherwise
3003 provided, amounts herein specifically appropriated shall be in
3004 lieu of the amounts heretofore provided or appropriated by law
3005 for such purposes. The amounts herein appropriated are the
3006 maximum amounts to be expended for the purposes herein
3007 designated and in no event shall the maximum expenditure
3008 provided for any items of expense exceed the amount allocated
3009 herein except as may be further provided for under this act,
3010 as provided in the Budget Management Act of 1976, Sections

3012 appropriations herein made are and shall be subject to terms,



3013 conditions, provisions and limitations of Sections 41-4-80, et
3014 seq., Code of Alabama 1975, and the Budget Management Act of
3015 1976, Sections 41-19-1, et seq., Code of Alabama 1975.

3016 Section 19. In addition to all appropriations
3017 heretofore and hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated
3018 such amounts as may be necessary for public funds transferred
3019 into the State Treasury, in accordance with Executive Order
3020 No. 726.

3021 Section 20. (a) In addition to the all appropriations
3022 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated the
3023 sum of \$65,000,000 from the College and Higher Education
3024 Excellence and Results (CHEER) Fund, established by HB565 or
3025 SB344 of the 2026 Regular Session, or other act of the

3047 (b) The above funds shall be utilized by the
3048 institutions to serve the needs of their student population in
3049 a manner that directly supports and advances the individual
3050 performance outcome categories selected by the Outcomes-Based
3051 Higher Education Funding Coordinating Committee in a manner to
3052 result in measurable improvements in the student success
3053 factors. Provided, however, bonus funding received by premier
3054 research universities for increased research expenditures may
3055 be used for enhancing and increasing research and innovation
3056 including equipment, instrumentation, and infrastructure
3057 (e.g., hardware and software); recruiting principal
3058 investigators, graduate research students; capital projects,
3059 including renovation of existing facilities; associated
3060 operating and maintenance costs; and matching funds for
3061 federal grants and contracts.

3062 Section 21. It is the intent of the Legislature that
3063 any institution accepting funds appropriated in this bill do
3064 so contingent upon their compliance with the provisions of

3066 Section 22. If any section, paragraph, sentence,

3068 portion of the appropriations herein made is held
3069 unconstitutional or invalid, it shall not affect any other
3070 section, paragraph, sentence, clause, provision, or portion of
3071 this act or any other appropriation or appropriations or

3074 Section 23. All laws or parts of laws, general,
3075 special, private, or local in conflict with or inconsistent
3076 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

3077 Section 24. This act shall become effective on October
